A NOTE FROM THE DIRECTOR

A mystery is a piece of fiction, dealing usually with the solution of a puzzling crime. A mystery may also be a profound, inexplicable or secretive quality. In both Rupert Holmes' musical comedy and Charles Dickens' final and unfinished novel, we are confronted by both definitions. Both works are fictitious and attempt to solve a crime. But the "mystery" of Edwin Drood refers as well to the secretive quality each work possesses. The novel is mysterious, perhaps by sheer coincidence - Dickens died before completing it. But the musical is secretive, if not contradictory, to prove a point. Appearances can be deceiving. The "mystery" of Edwin Drood is that nothing is as it appears.

The musical is filled with contradictions, loose ends and, indeed, dead ends. Pay attention not only to what its characters

say, but also to what they do. What in solving this mystery is vital and what is misleading? It's your task to decide. There in no right or wrong ending, just the solution you select.

And solutions will vary from person to person just as they will, ultimately, from night to night. No two people will witness the show in exactly the same way. Audience members individually retain certain pieces of information while placing less importance on others. Your solution, therefore, may be markedly different from the person next to you. This variance in the formulation of "Drood's" ending mirrors a common human trait. We all selectively perceive events in our world and draw conclusions based on the limiting pictures we've devised. That is the mystery of Edwin Drood.
