

The lovable 'Peanuts' gang takes stage at Theatre in Park

Robert Hingula has put aside the razor he wielded as the Demon Barber of Fleet Street in "Sweeney Todd" to don Snoopy's flying helmet and goggles in "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown."

"Sweeney Todd is a more difficult role because of the emotional challenges it presents. Snoopy requires more energy because he's always on the move chasing the Red Baron," Hingula said with a laugh. "There's definitely a contrast in roles. I'm glad I did both this season."

"You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown," the 2012 season finale, opened Friday at The Theatre in the Park in Shawnee Mission Park.

It's being directed by Tim Bair, the organization's producing artistic director, marking the first time an executive producer has personally directed a show at The Theatre in the Park.

"I think it's a good idea," said Jill Geller, superintendent of recreation with the Johnson County Parks and Recreation District, which sponsors The

Theatre in the Park. "It gives Tim a different perspective. I don't know when or if it will happen again. It depends on whether he has time to do it."

Bair said he is happy to get the chance to direct a production. He loves the fact that the work keeps him in touch with actors and what's happening on the stage, but it's a challenge.

"It seems there's always something that demands my time but that's life in the theater," he said.

This is the second time Bair has directed "You're a Good

Man, Charlie Brown." The first was when he was producing artistic director of the Millbrook Playhouse in Lock Haven, Pa. And Bair frequently directed shows when he was producing artistic director at the American Musical Theatre in San Jose, Calif. He moved to The Theatre in the Park in 2010.

In the local production, Charlie Brown is portrayed by Andrew Schmidt, who moved to Kansas City from Columbus,

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Ohio, in March. It's his first show in the Kansas City area.

"I like playing Charlie Brown," Schmidt said. "I think there's a lot of Charlie Brown in all of us. He's sincere but gets flustered easily and most of the time doesn't think very highly of himself."

Schmidt said he moved to the Kansas City area because he believed there are more theater possibilities here than in Columbus. He graduated from Baldwin-Wallace University in Berea, Ohio, in 2007 with a degree in musical theater then spent two years in New York City.

Joella Wolnik of Overland Park, a junior at Wichita State University majoring in musical theater, plays Lucy, Charlie Brown's nemesis.

"I enjoy playing her because I'm usually cast as some innocent type. I get to play a bratty character in this show. It's fun," she said.

Matthew King of Leawood is Schroeder.

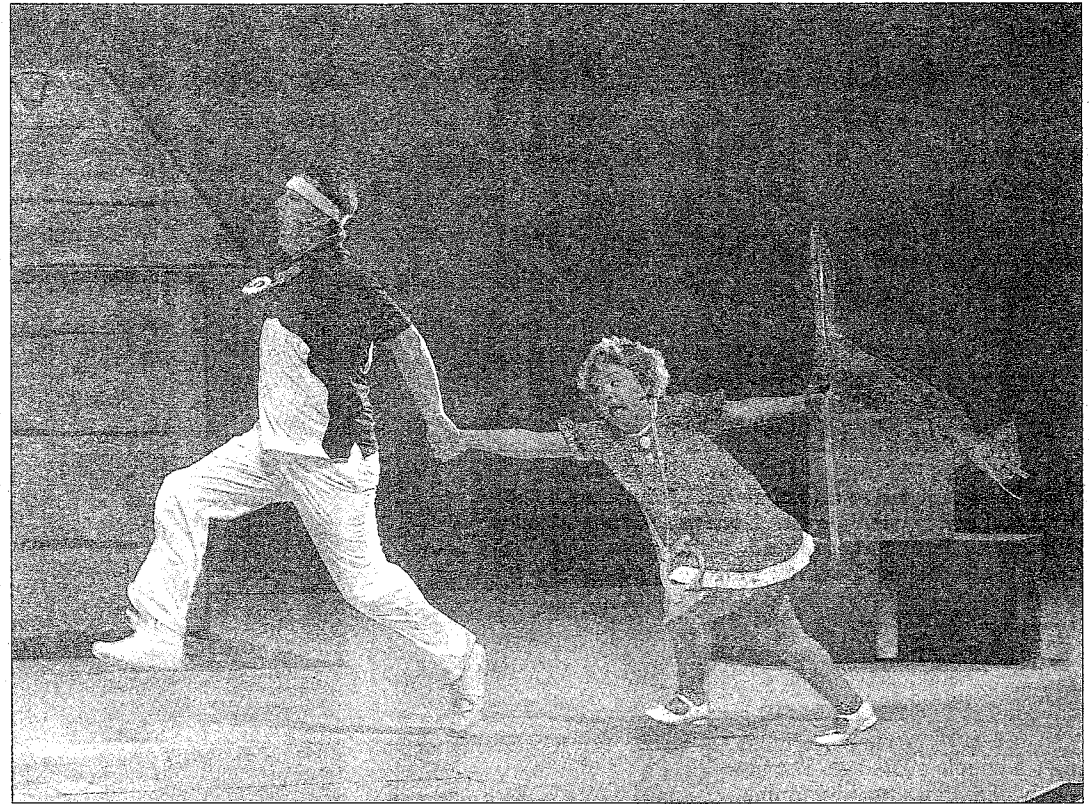

This is Vargo's third show at The Theatre. She was in "Annie" in 2010 and "Seussical" last summer.

Brant Stacy of Overland Park, a graduate of the University of Kansas, plays Linus.

"It takes some doing to play a kid at my age," he said.

This is his fourth show at The Theatre. He has performed in "42nd Street," "The Wedding Singer" and "All Shook Up."
