
## Theatre in the Park looks ahead



tertaining from start to finish. It goes 100 miles an hour all the time. It's fun because it doesn't take itself too seriously. There's always room for a show like that."

Ruder calls herself a Disney fanatic and says she is excited to work with young actors again. Ruder directed Disney's "High School Musical" in 2009 and "Annie" in 2010.

portunities The Theatre provides for young actors to develop into future Broadway and Hollywood stars," she said. "The challenge of bringing two classic Disney stories to the stage is one I can't wait to tackle."

Ruder will have different casts of approximately 25 youngsters, ages 9 to 18, for each show. Each runs about an hour.

"That's the usual time for most musicals," she said. "The biggest difference for me will be coming up with two visions instead of one."

David Hastings, a theater teacher at Olathe South High School, loves the music of "Urinetown." It seems to me the creators of 'Urinetown' are mixing musical theater and humor as a way to get us to talk about important issues," said Hastings, who last year directed "Les Miserables" at The Theatre. "I believe this is when musical theater is at its best."

Bair has directed "You're a Good Man, Charlie Brown" before.

The 2012 season includes five productions instead of the customary four, and all are being produced at The Theatre in the Park for the first time.
